ERNEST H. DARNABY

Superintendent of Bourbon County schools; A.B., University of Kentucky; M. A., University of Kentucky.

Mr. Darnaby became superintendent of the Bourbon County schools in January 1939. Prior to assuming the duties of the chief executive of the schools of the county, he held teaching positions in Clintonville, Mt. Sterling and other central Kentucky towns. Under his supervision many improvements have been made in the county school system.



JOHN T. GENTRY

Principal; A.B., Transylvania College; Graduate Work, University of Kentucky.

Mr. Gentry came to the North Middletown school as the head basketball coach and teacher of history in 1934. He worked in that capacity until the spring of 1940 when he accepted a similar position in the Fayette county schools. In the fall of 1942 he returned to North Middletown as the principal of the school and coach of the basketball team. During the years he has coached basketball in this school, Mr. Gentry's teams have won five county tournaments, one district tournament, and at one time reached the semi-finals in the regional tournament, being defeated by Maysville, who bowed to Ralph Beard and his fellow team mates from Louisville Male high school in the state tournament.
