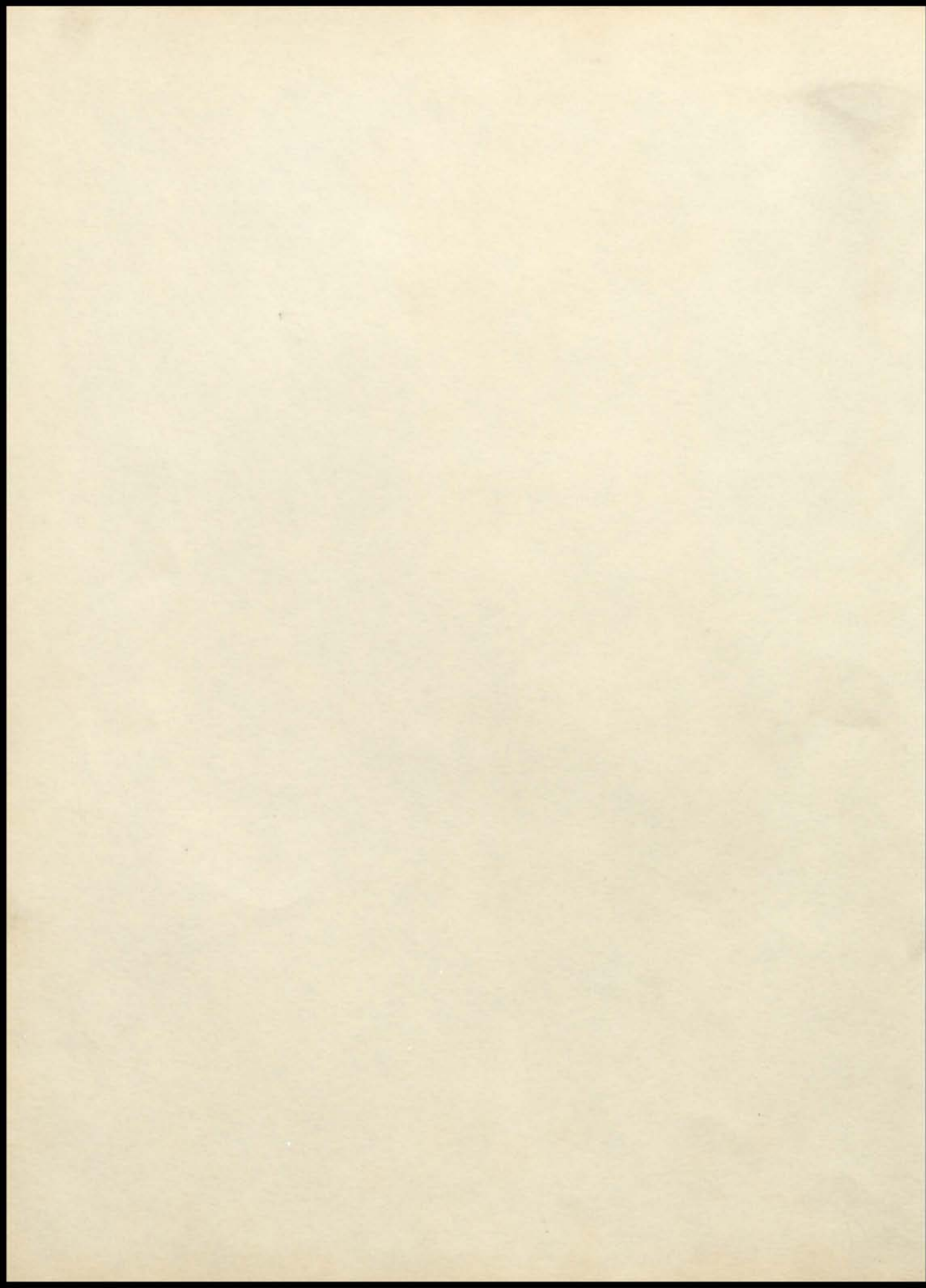

Our Town Today

Located in the "Heart of the Bluegrass," surrounded by magnificent thoroughbred horse farms, Millersburg is one of the oldest towns in the state and has for many, many years been a noted educational center. With a population of less than one thousand, Millersburg is an entirely residential community. Bus, rail and air connections to Lexington and Cincinnati make the institute accessible to all parts of the country. Highway No. 68 passes through Millersburg . . . Highways No. 25, 27 and 60 are within only a few miles of the institute.

John Miller, the founder of Millersburg, Bourbon County, Kentucky, was born in Sherman's Valley, near Carlisle, Pennsylvania, September 21, 1752. He served during the Revolutionary War with the rank of Major. In 1778, he and his two brothers, along with fifteen others were induced by the Governor of Virginia, who gave to each of them a pre-emption grant of 400 acres, to migrate to Kentucky, then a part of Fincastle County, Virginia. Major John Miller and his two brothers located in what is now Millersburg Precinct.

In 1798 Major Miller surveyed 100 acres which was laid off in lots and incorporated the Town of Millersburg. The settlement grew in population and importance as it was on the highway of immigration into Kentucky from the East. Millersburg has never been, nor will it ever be a "boom town."

From the days of its founding, 1893, Millersburg Military Institute has been an outstanding and potent force molding young men for careers. Established by Colonel C. M. Best, who adopted the slogan "Right Training is Better than Riches," the institute has endeavored to inculcate basic principles of character while developing sound scholarship.

With an enrollment of two hundred and fifty cadets, the institute emphasizes the development of honor, truthfulness and a sense of duty in all relations. The purpose of the institute is to give thorough preparation for colleges and universities and for the practical business of life.

This stately colonial mansion, built in 1851, came into the possession of Millersburg Military Institute in 1920. Before the advent of railroads, this building was the stopping place of the great Henry Clay on his way to and from Maysville from Lexington.

Memorial Gymnasium



Constructed in 1946, this gymnasium was built as a memorial to the alumni and instructors of the institute who served in World War Two.

The main floor is used for basketball and includes a large stage used for dramatic presentations and assembly programs.

Under the main floor of the gymnasium and extending the full length of the building is a recreation room. Activities such as wrestling, ping-pong and riflery are conducted in this area during the after-school hours.

A memorial plaque is mounted on the southwest corner of the building with a satellite star placed on the sidewalk fronting same. All uniform personnel are to honor M.M.I. cadets killed in action, whose names appear thereon, by saluting the plaque when crossing the star.



Moffett Hall



This two-story red brick building constructed in 1921, houses the Band Company. This building bears the name of Albert T. Moffett, former president of the Board of Trustees, in recognition of the active part he played in the reorganization of the Institute (1920) until his death December 17, 1930.

There are accommodations in this barracks for thirty-two cadets and two faculty officers, with shower rooms and toilet facilities on each floor.

RANKIN HALL—was named in honor of Oscar R. Rankin, for many years one of the most active members of the Board of Trustees and one of the most conscientious contributors in the advancement of the Institute. This two story structure provides space for the Science Department laboratories in addition to the classrooms and library which are located on the first floor. On the second floor, is located quarters for a rifle company of approximately fifty cadets and two faculty officers.

The Allie H. Miller Hall



Mrs. W. M. Miller, pictured above, was paid tribute by the Board of Trustees at the annual spring meeting on May 11, 1963, in naming this barracks in her honor. Mrs. Miller is a member of the Board of Trustees and her participation in civic, religious and educational affairs are acknowledged in this dedication. MILLER BARRACKS, completed in 1946, accommodates approximately 75 cadets and is absolutely fireproof.

Mrs. Miller's home, built in 1870, is one of the first buildings in Millersburg, constructed of field stone, and has gained national recognition for the unusual entrance. Legend has it that Lafayette has rested here on occasions.

Mrs. Miller's two sons graduated from M.M.I. William McClure, deceased, graduated in 1924. Charles Hart Miller, a 1925 graduate, received his degree from the University of Kentucky and his Master's degree from the University of New York. His military service was spent in the U. S. Army Air Corps and is now living in Burbank, California where he is President of the Sierracian Corporation. In 1961, Charles Hart Miller was presented with the Alumni Silver Cup.

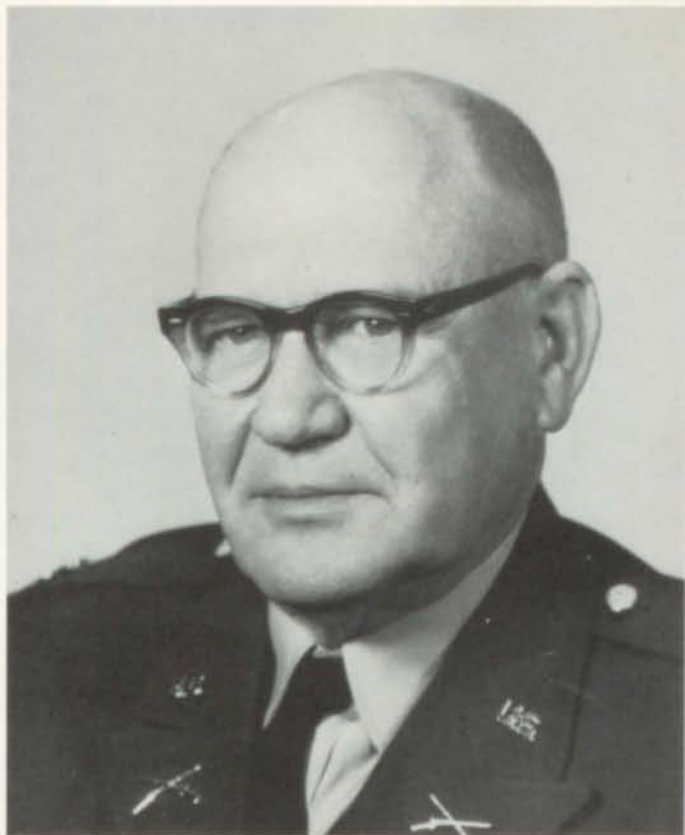
Tuition, fees, and other charges paid by the students represent the instructional and operating expenses of the Institute. No direct financial support is received from any governmental agency.

The Academic Program

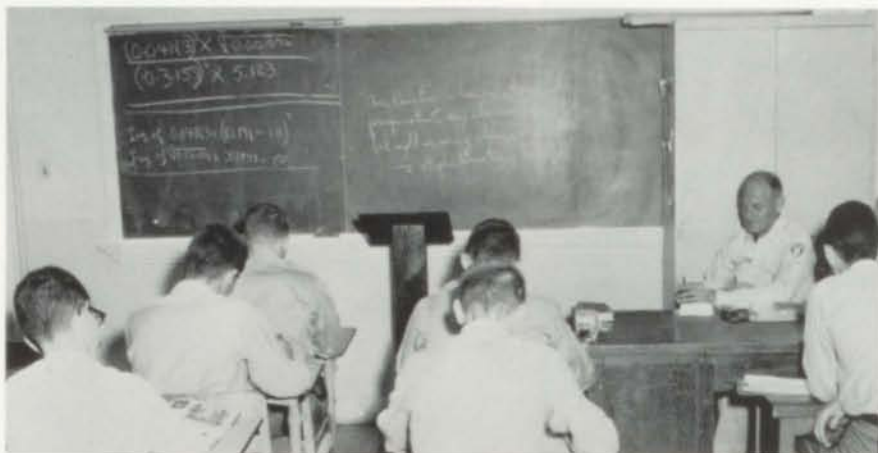

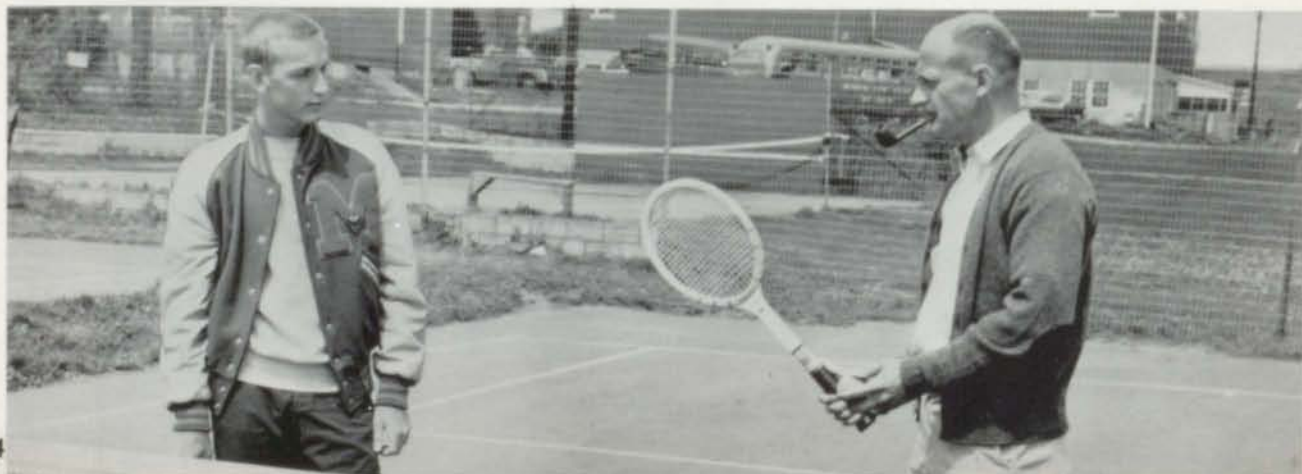
1963 — Post Graduates

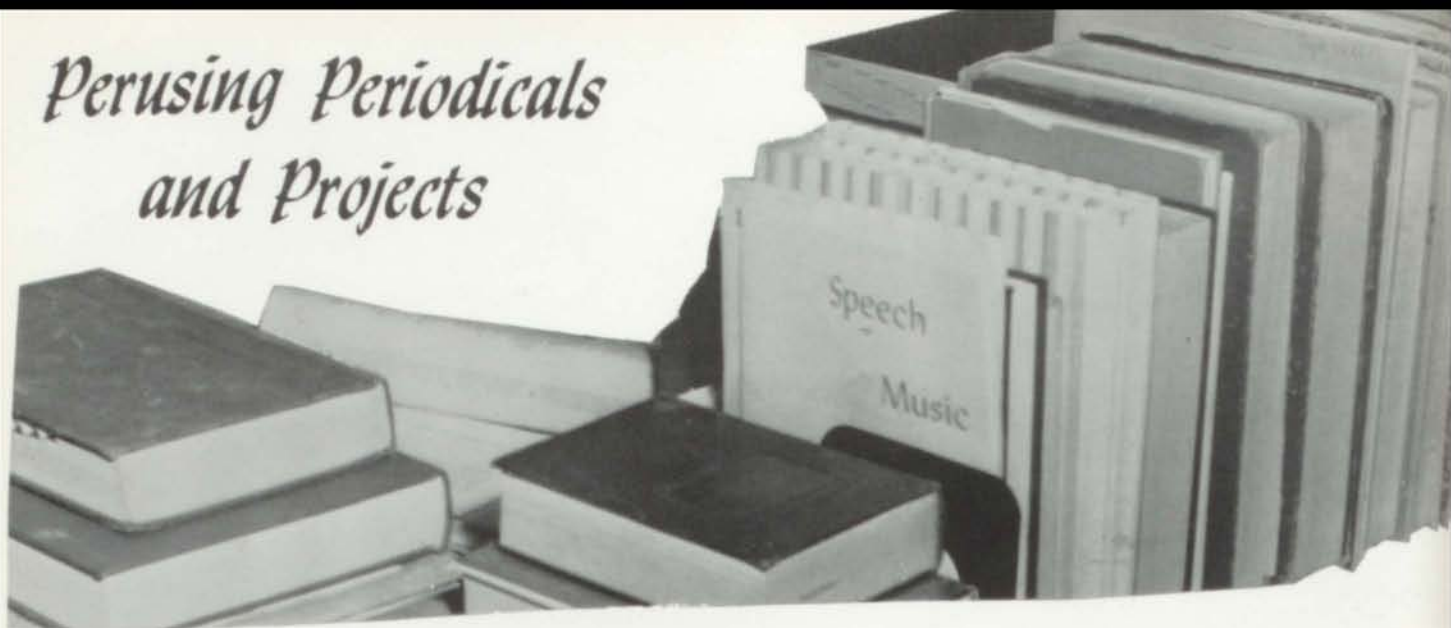

It is a pleasure to send you the enclosed Certificate of Admission to Harvard College. It is our formal notice of the vote of the Admission and Scholarship Committee to admit you to the Class of 1967.

The Committee has also voted to award you a Freshman scholarship with a stipend of \$600, and to offer you further assistance of at least \$800 in the form of a part-time job and a long-term loan. We shall reserve a \$400 part-time job for you and set aside at least \$400 from our loan funds if you wish to replace or to supplement the job. The award of the scholarship does not depend upon your acceptance of the job or loan offer, and you are free to accept this additional aid in a smaller amount if you wish.

Twenty-eight hundred of our candidates applied for financial aid this year; altogether, fifty-one hundred candidates applied for admission for an entering class of twelve hundred. Your success in winning one of the three hundred and fifty scholarships for the Class of 1967 indicates our conviction that you are exceptionally well qualified for Harvard both intellectually and personally, and that you will do well here.

Please let us know as soon as you conveniently can whether you accept your admission and scholarship. The enclosed post cards should be filled out and returned to us no later than May 1, although we hope you will be able to reach a decision before then. If you elect to accept the loan offer, please indicate the amount you wish to borrow, and submit the enclosed application by August 1.

A room application and information about the freshman year will be sent to you after we have received the cards. Please don't hesitate to write us if you have any questions.

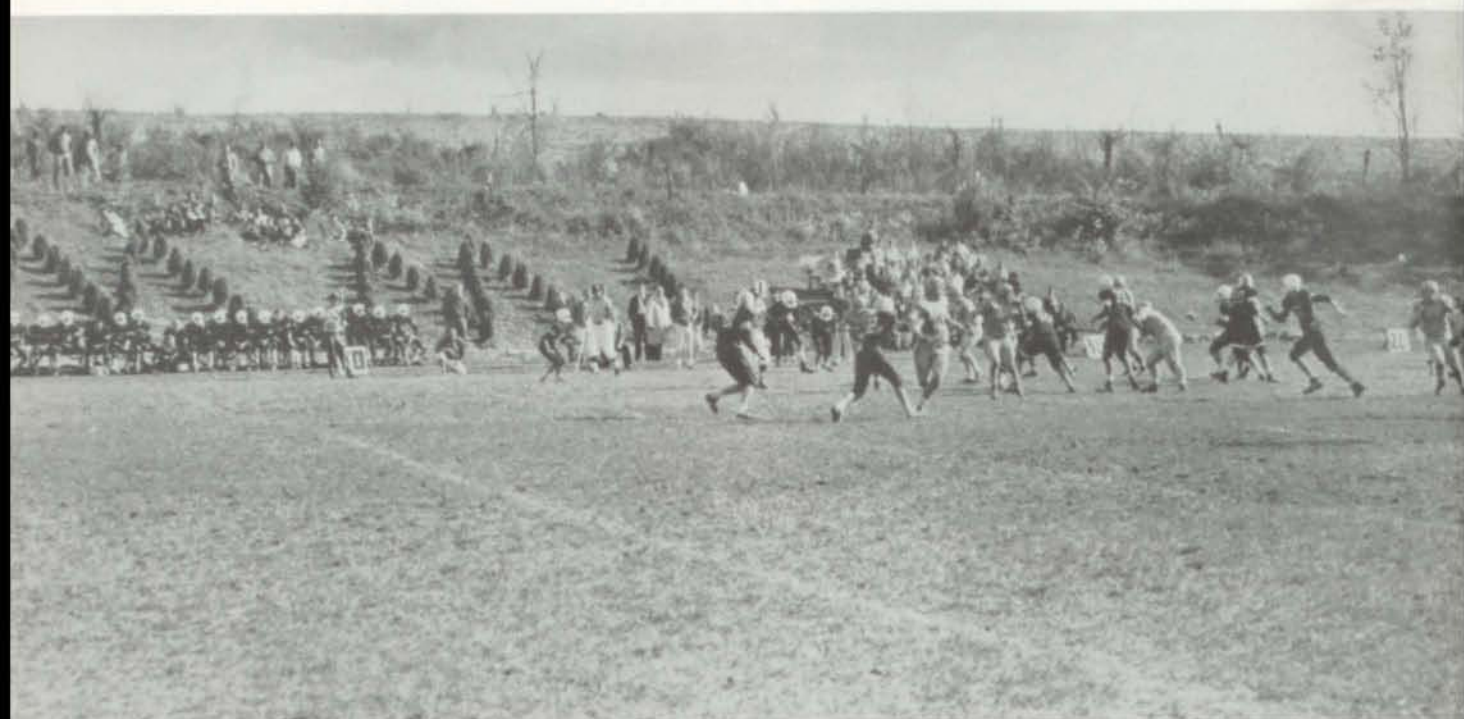
ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

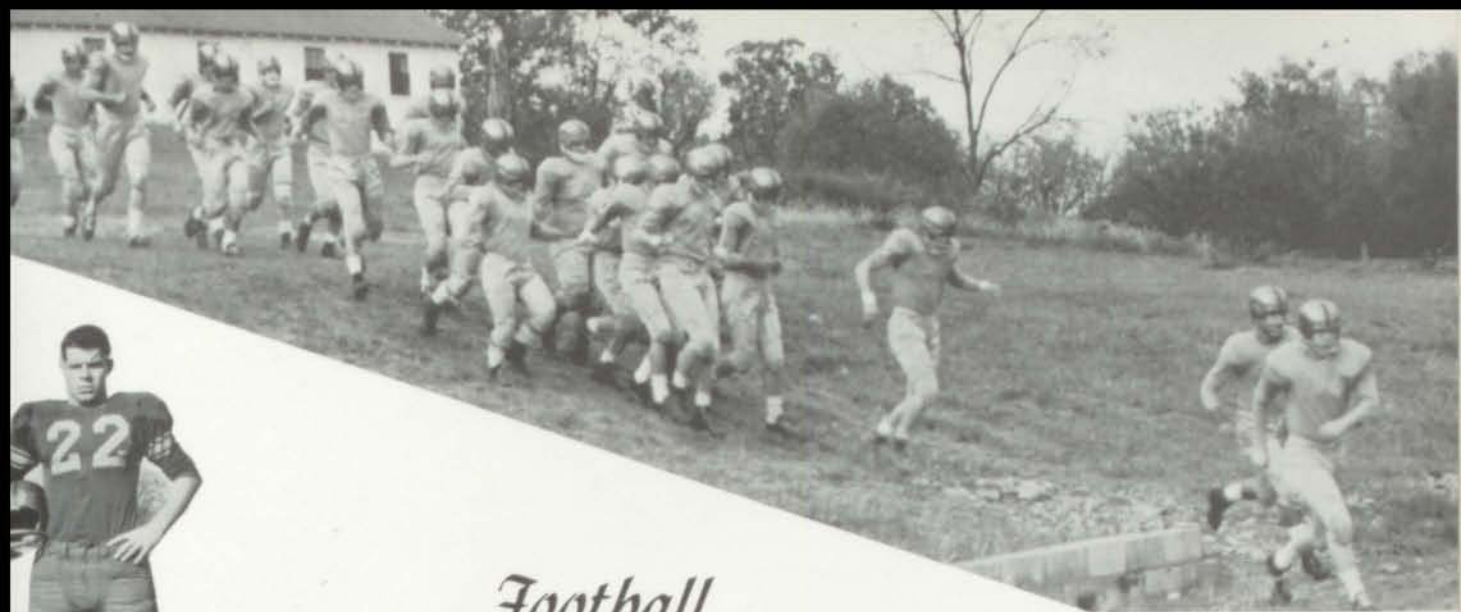


REES FIELD

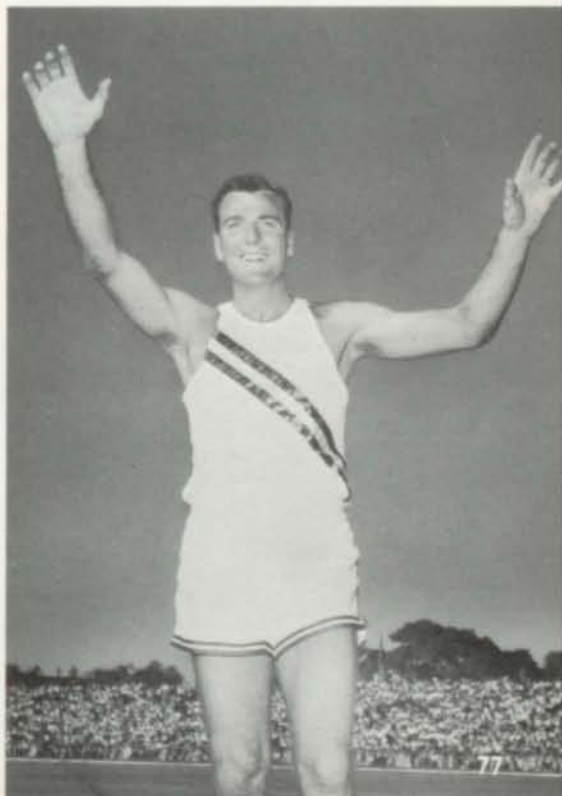
And Thrills A-Plenty on Our Second Annual Invitational Relay

Interesting and Informative Chapel Speakers and Entertainers

In 1957 he received the Fulbright Scholarship for one year at the University in Sydney, Australia. The following year he received his Doctor's degree from M.I.T.

In 1960 he received a National Science Foundation grant at the Central European Nuclear Research Center near Geneva, Switzerland.

Now associated with the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory at the University of California, he is working with a high energy particle accelerator which is used for experiments of elementary particles.



Benjamin S. Schwartz, famed juvenile judge of Hamilton County, Ohio, was another of our assembly speakers during the past year.

Judge Schwartz is national chairman of the Work Camp Committee of the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges and holds office in the Ohio Association of Juvenile Court Judges.

His primary interest is in youth and civic work and his juvenile court has been recognized nationally for its unique programs, among which are work therapy and job placement and has one of the finest medical and psychiatric clinics and traffic schools in America.

Judge Schwartz was described in a recent article in the Saturday Evening Post as an "enlightened jurist."

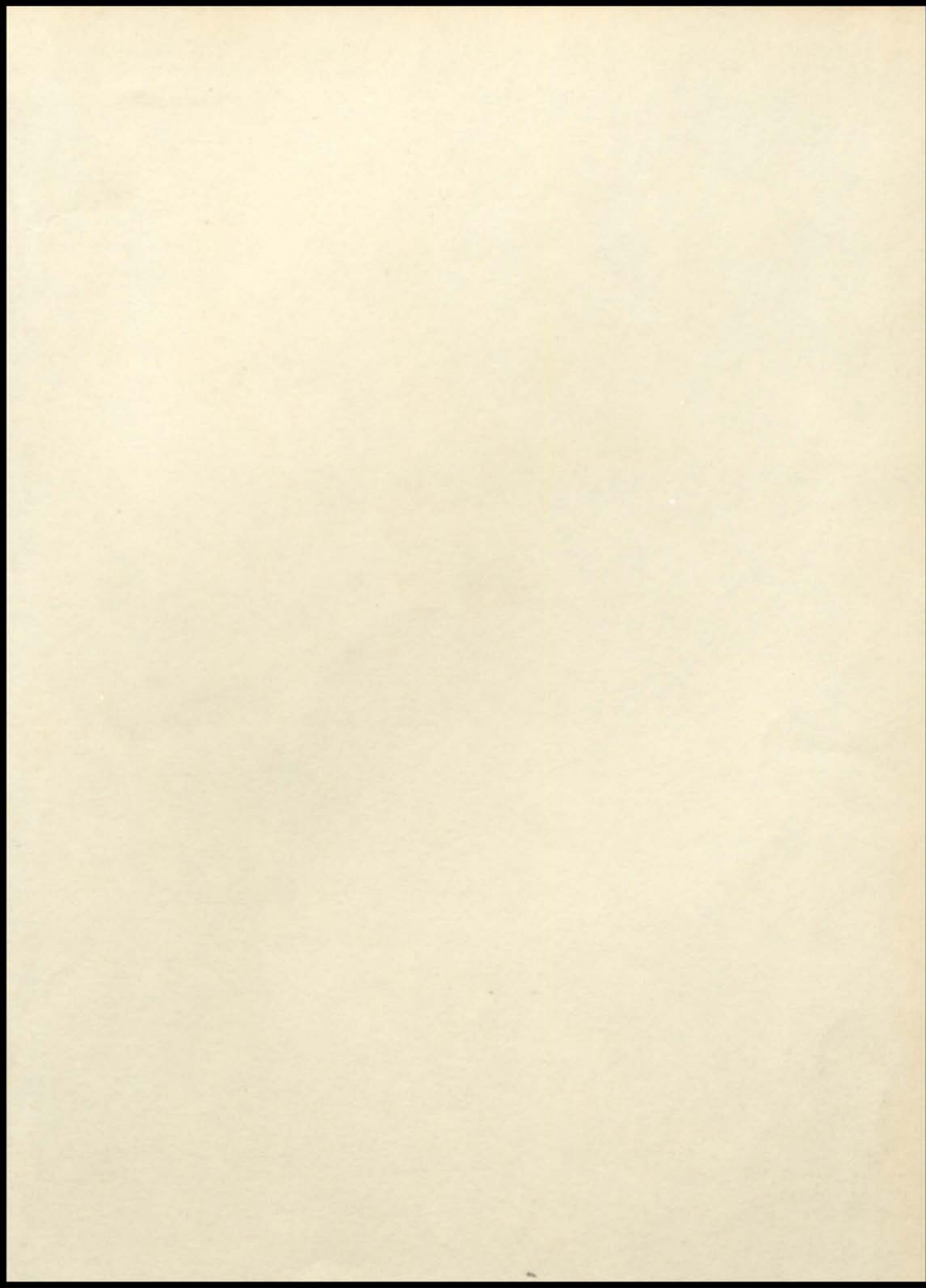
