


Dedication

> ""Who are you? Who are you? You are the ones who are putting us through.""





L. U. CHAPPELLE


"Of all true words of tongue or pen, The truest are these, 'I can't live without men."

"Industry is Fortune's right hand"


Allen is very industrious, and especially so in bookkeeping. He will probably be an accountant some day with a salary of fifty dollars an hour.








PARIS ELEMENTARY AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

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

THEODORE BUTLER, End


This is Butler's first year out for football, but he shows remarkable ability and grit on the team.

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

EDWARD DALZELLE, Center


"Fats" could play any position on the team with the same skill. He always worked hard when on the floor, and he was always ready to do his part whenever he was called on.

JAMES HILL, Forward


Hill is a good little player, and he always worked hard for the good of his team. We hope he makes the first five next year.








GIRLS' BASKET BALL SQUAD


FRANCES DUDLEY, Guard



JUNIOR HIGH GIRLS' GYMNASIUM CLASS

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

The success of all these activities is due to the supervision of Mrs. Dan Peed, who is one of the most efficient and lovable teachers this school has ever had.


The Commercial Club

Here's to the Commercial Club, and may she always be as successful in the future as she has been in the first year of organization!

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







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

We want to thank everyone who has helped give Paris High School her enviable record in public speaking. May the good work continue!


