FRANCES DUDLEY, *Guard*

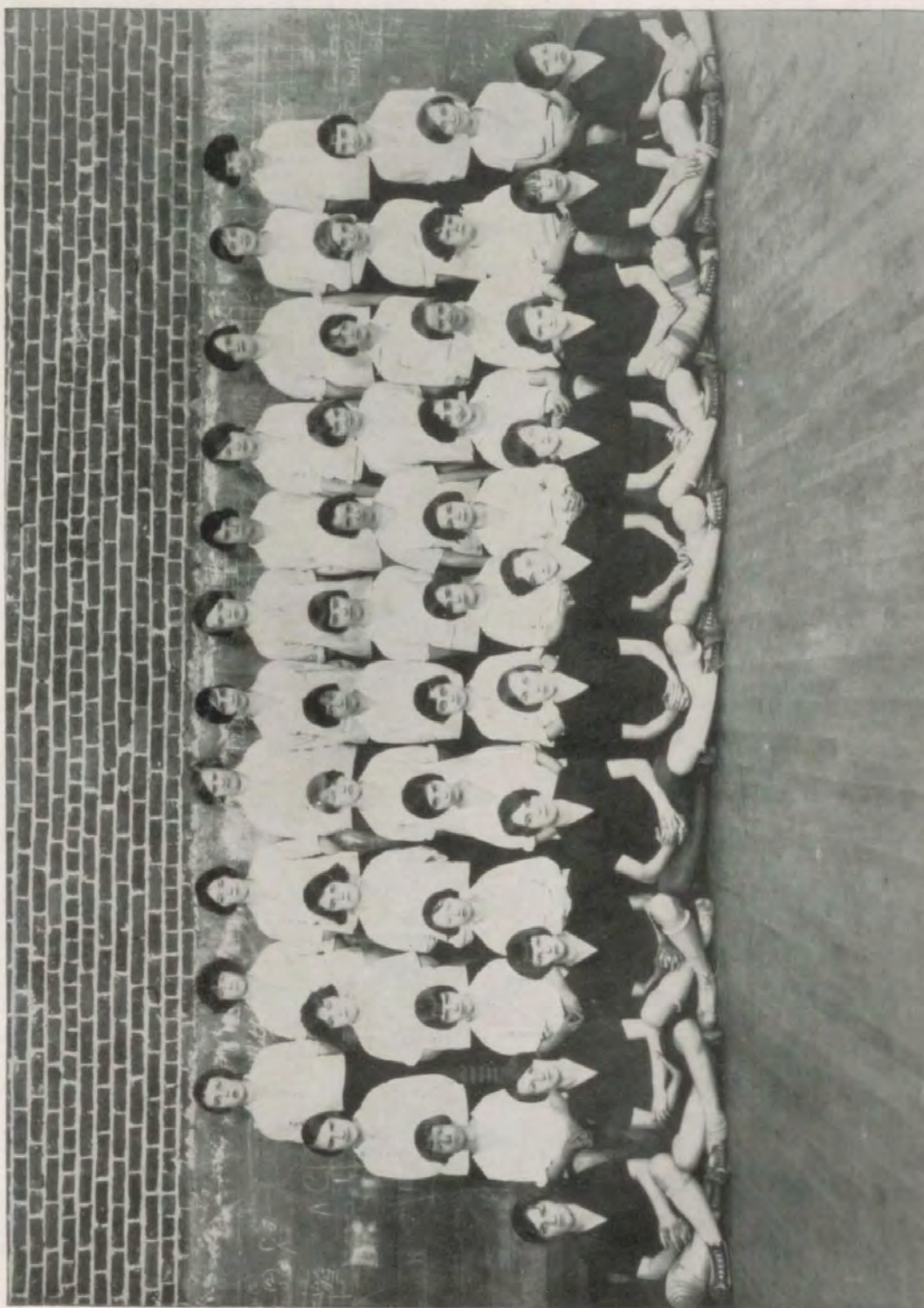
