In the district tournament which was held at Lafayette High School on March 17 and 18, Faith Hall Phillips and Ann Dudley Carr, upholding the affirmative, and Barbara Winters and Billy Joe Johnston, defending the negative, made Paris High School eligible for the state debating tournament by winning three out of five debates. On March 24 and 25 the two teams won three debates in the National Forensic district tournament which was held in Harrodsburg.

The climax of the year was reached when Paris was represented, for the sixth time since 1921, in the state tournament at the University of Kentucky. The tournament team, composed of Ann Dudley Carr and Faith Hall Phillips gained entrance in the finals by defeating the teams from Loyall, Butler, Frankfort, Murray, Highlights, and Harrodsburg. In the final debate at Memorial Hall, Paris was defeated by Henry Clay High School.

Their appearance in the National Debate Tournament will close a very successful debate for the Paris High School debaters and their coach.




Nine Seniors received invitations to become members of the Service Club at the opening of this school year and eleven members were added at the beginning of the second semester, making a total membership of twenty.


COACH COLLIER






