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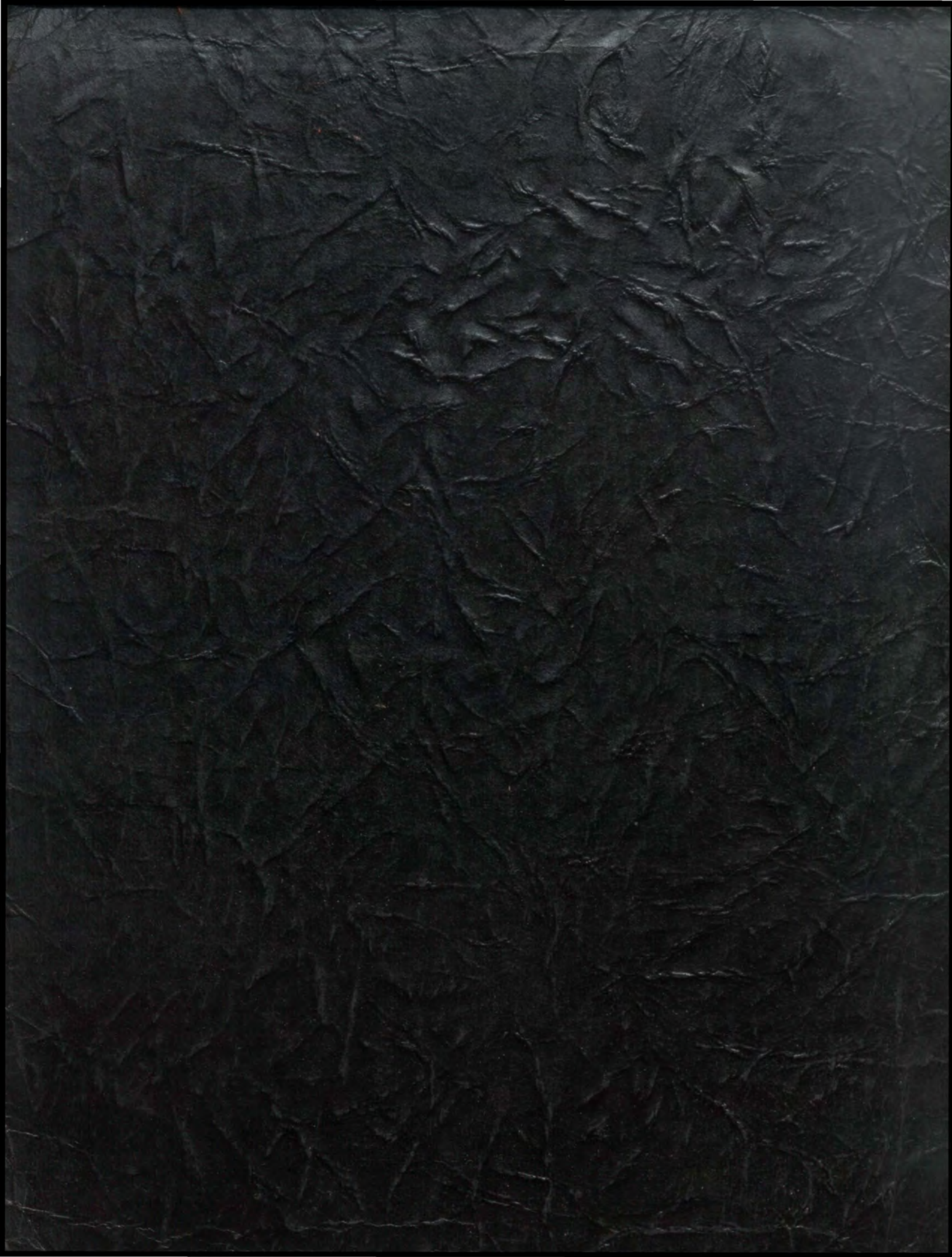
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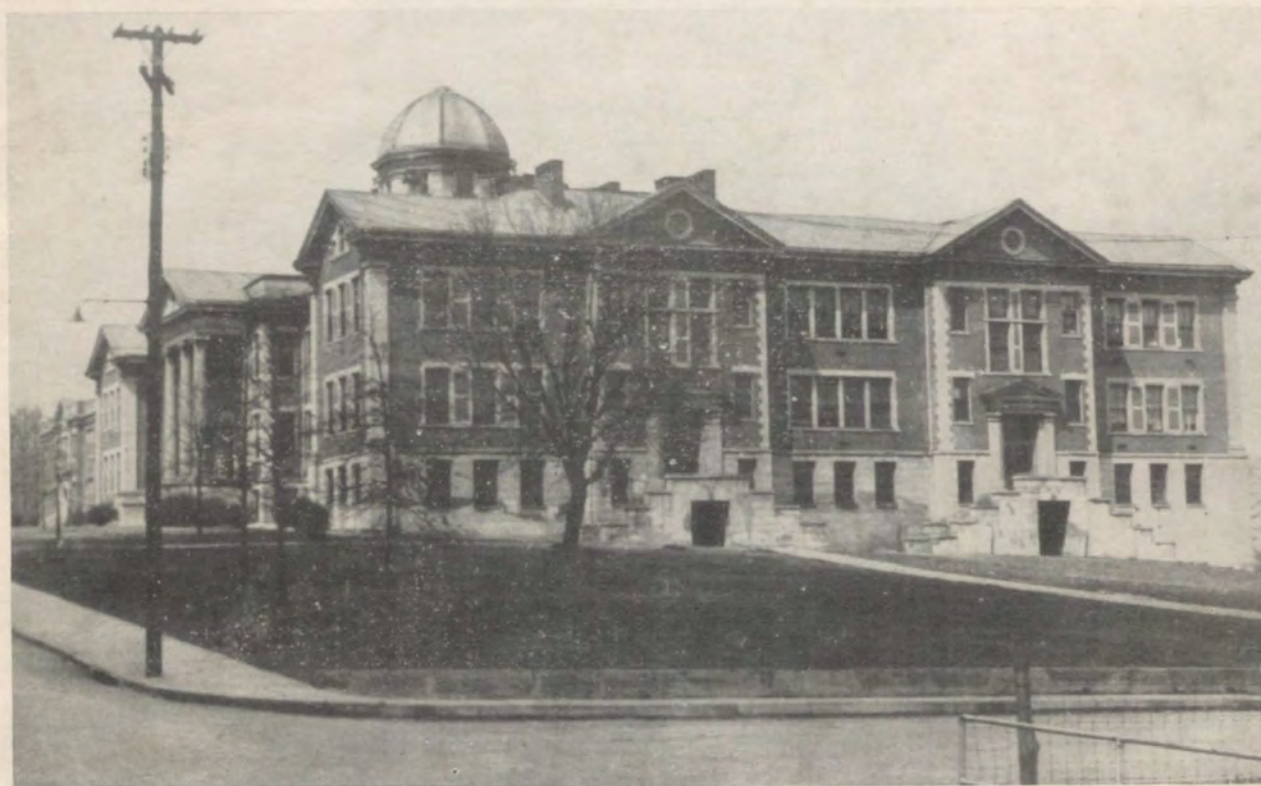

The Senior class of 1948 reverently pays respect and tribute to two of our most beloved teachers and friends. We say teachers because they taught us the fundamentals of a sound education. We say friends because they were our friends; ones who felt with us in our moments of joy and sorrow.

When we figure collectively of the teachers we have had, we find it runs into quite a large group—a group so fine that to try to select one or two outstanding ones from it would be doing injustice to the rest. But these two, we will say that they both were as good teachers as anyone could hope to have.

Mrs. Gaynelle Terry was a member of our school faculty part of the 1944 school year and through 1945; however in this short time she attained a high degree of appreciation among all the students, and every one with whom she came in contact was very devoted to her. Mr. Scott credited Mrs. Terry with sending the best prepared Algebra class to Senior High that he had ever received.

Mr. Felix Amos Scott served as Principal of Paris High School from 1921-1946. Previous to this he served as Lieutenant in the American Expeditionary Forces in Europe. Having service, fellowship, and honor as his watch words, he tried to impress upon everyone the value of citizenship and clean living. A firm believer in fair play, Mr. Scott did not believe in punishing or reprimanding students but in pointing out their mistakes, and helping to correct them.

We thank them—Mrs. Terry, Mr. Scott, and all of our other teachers for their guidance and understanding in not only our lessons but our lives. We shall hold them in our memories for the rest of our lives.

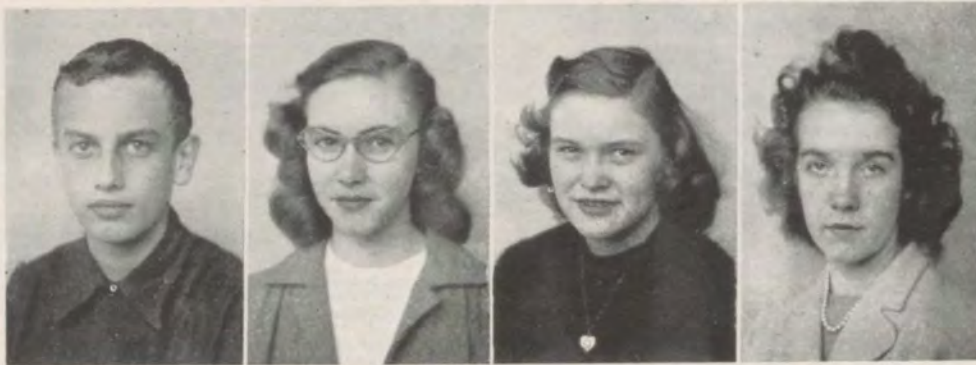

We'll worry tomorrow for it's another day.

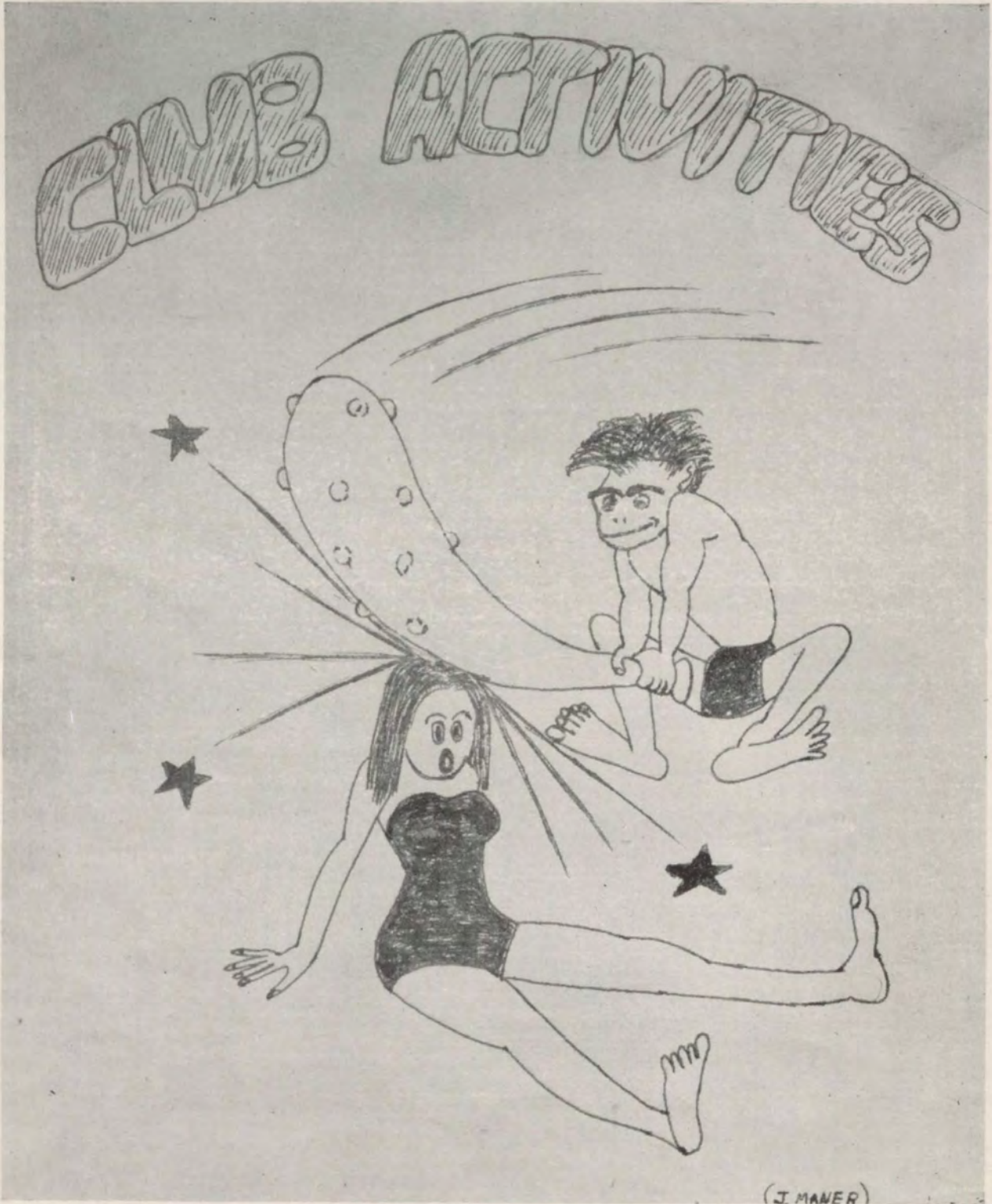
THE SOPHOMORE CLASS OF '48

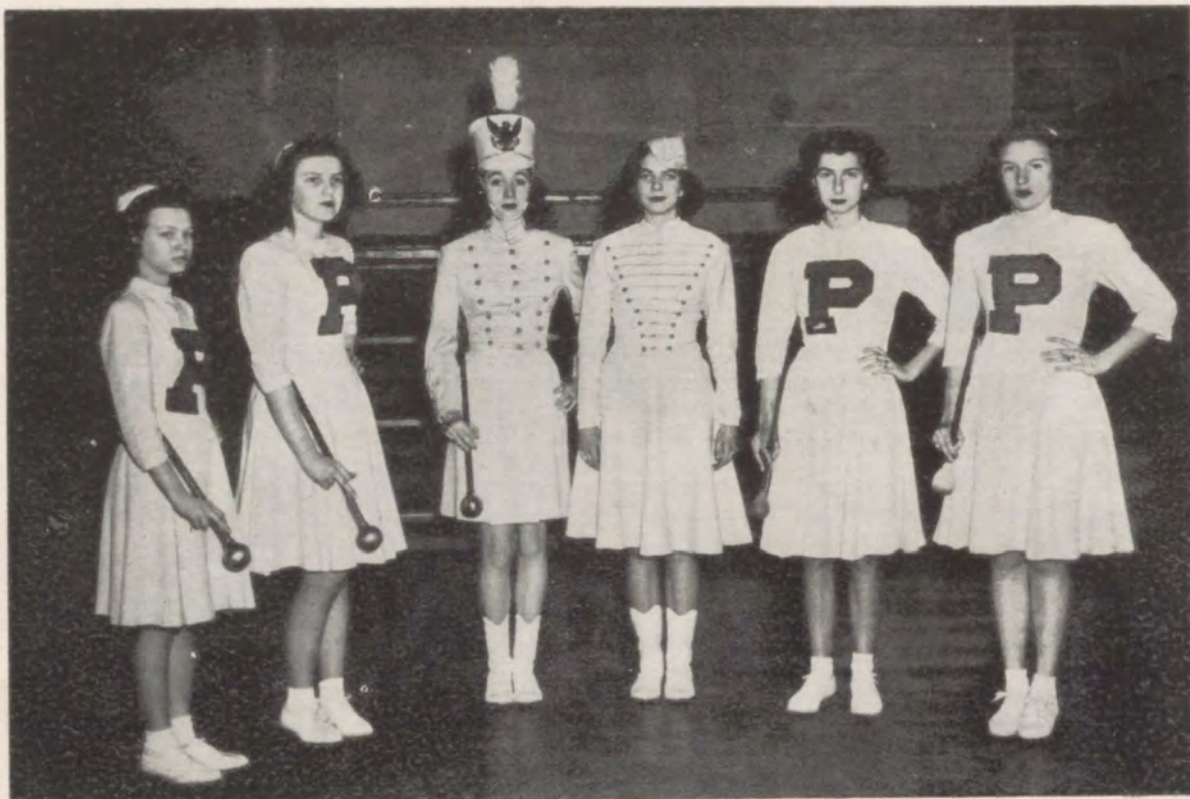

We're sure to have a win.

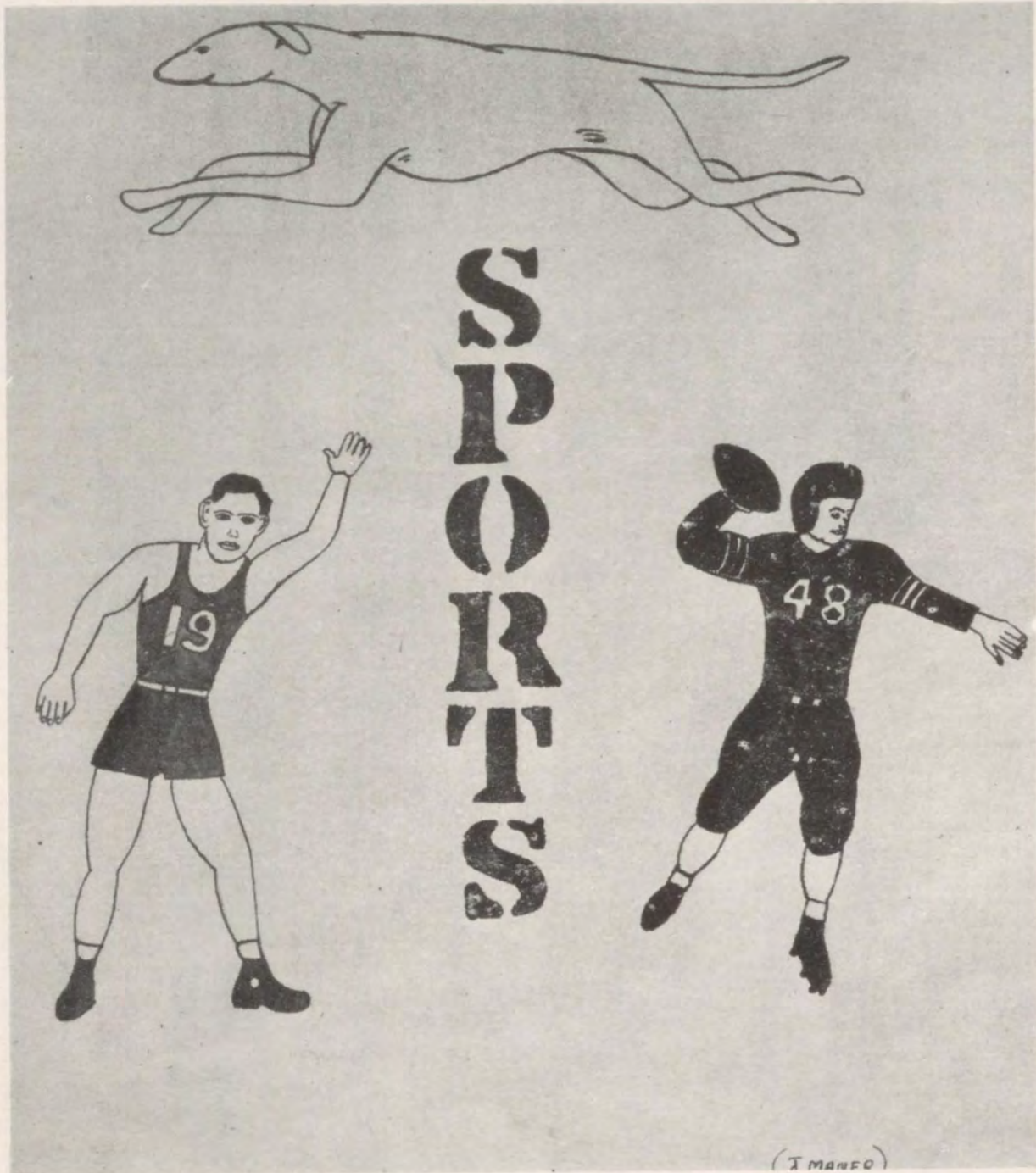
At the half of the game Paris led by nine.

BASKETBALL TEAM

Under the guidance of Coaches Jimmy Rose and Bill Brophy, the Greyhounds of Paris High School had a very successful basketball season after a delayed start. Because of the suspension from the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, the team's season was restricted until the first of January.

In the Central Kentucky Conference, the Greyhounds won eight and lost one game in an overtime period to Frankfort. Outside conference play the basketball team won four out of six games, dropping two to Clark County.

In the Fortieth District Tournament, the Greyhounds were victorious, defeating Carlisle in the finals. Bob Blake, Jack Steele, and Gayle Rose were awarded berths on the all tournament team. Jack Steele was presented a watch by Mr. Herbert Davis for being the most valuable player. All members of the Paris team were presented silver basketballs by Mr. Davis.

Outplaying Maysville until the final minutes of the game, Paris led them by seven points with three minutes to play. By outplaying Maysville, last year's State Champions and this year's runner-up, the Greyhounds received credit for being one of the top teams in the state. Mr. Davis presented Bob Blake and Attwell Adair gold basketballs for being the high-scorers for Paris in the tournament.

Paris received the bid from the 10th Regional in the Kiwanis Invitational Tournament in Lexington. Paris was defeated by Inez in the first round, but led much of the game. The Inez team was rated second in the state and by the showing of the Greyhounds, it was evident that they should have been rated higher than they were. Bob Blake and Gayle Rose were picked on the all tournament team.

Throughout the whole season the Greyhounds showed fine spirit and sportsmanship, and established a record to be well remembered by the students and fans.

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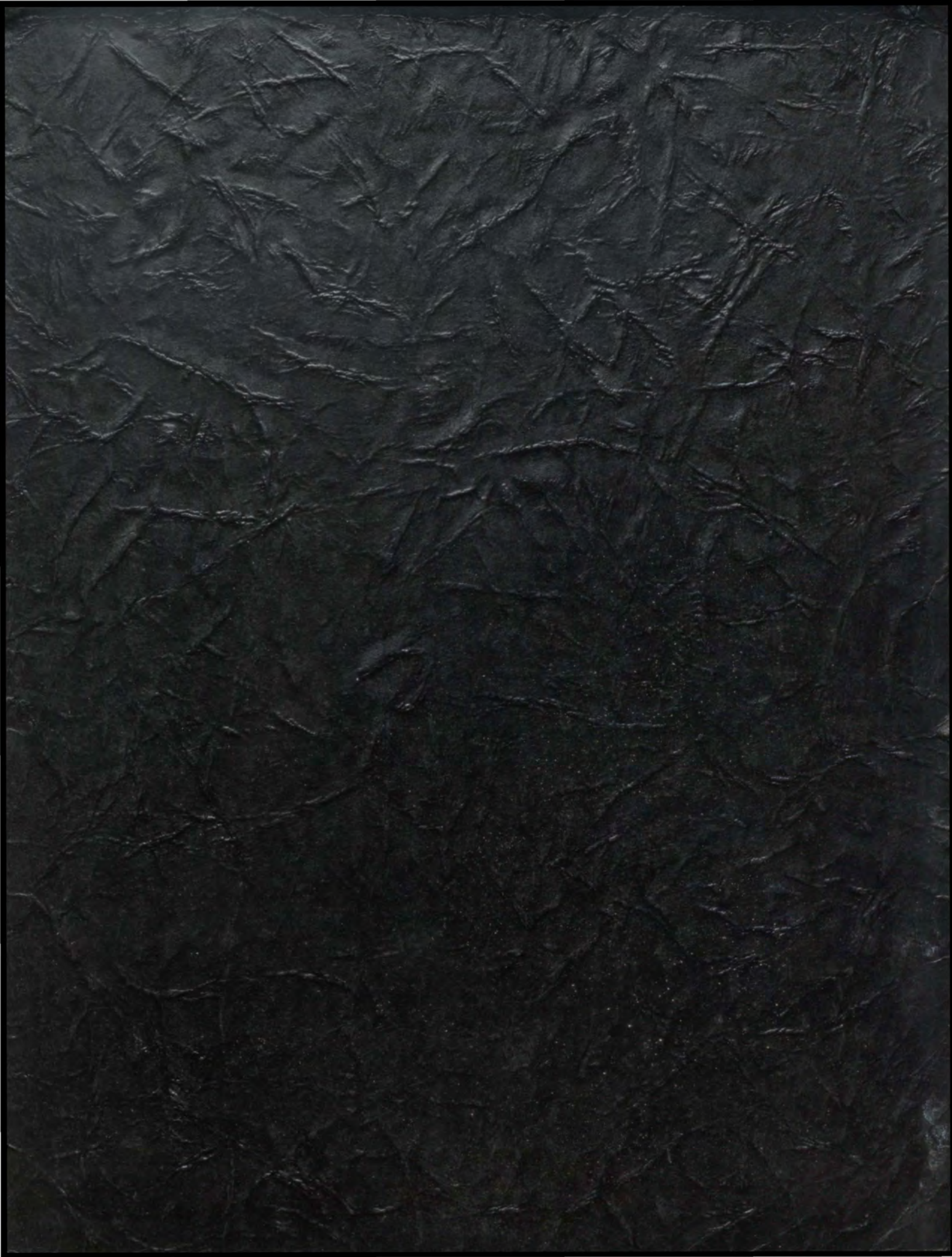
