



What Is the Junior High School?

The Junior High School is a movement to democratize secondary education in this country. The American High School could lay but little claim to democracy as long as it made an appeal to only one out of four children who were eligible to attend. A democratic scheme of secondary education should begin approximately with the twelfth year and should be thoroughly adapted to the needs and interests of all normal boys and girls.

The Junior High School is not an elementary school. Neither is it a high school. Neither is it a mixture of the two. It is a new institution. A new institution planned and operated to provide for the specific needs of those children for which neither of the older institutions made suitable provisions. It partakes to some extent of the nature of each of the old institutions, but it is essentially different from each as shown by the following purposes:

THE PURPOSES OF THE PARIS JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

I. To provide a suitable educational environment for children approximately twelve to sixteen years of age, embracing:

1. An enlarged experience background, involving especially:
 - (a) Enriched curricula and courses of study.
 - (b) Improved facilities by way of laboratories, shops, libraries, assembly halls, and gymnasiums.
 - (c) Experienced and well-trained teachers.
 - (d) New methods of teaching and social control.
 - (e) A distinctive school atmosphere.


II. To explore the interests, abilities, and likings of children of the Junior High School age, so that training adapted to them may be given.

III. To provide for the individual differences of pupils. This demands, among other things, flexible curriculum organization, opportunities for varying rates of progress, promotion by subjects and not by grades, and educational and vocational guidance for all pupils, and especially for those who must assuredly leave school early.


IV. To provide for a more gradual transition from elementary to secondary education.

V. To retain pupils in school longer by properly adjusting the subject matter, methods of teaching, and social control to the individual needs and desires of the pupils.

VI. To start each pupil on the career which, as a result of the exploratory courses, he, his parents, and the school, are convinced is most likely to be of profit to him and to the State.





Future Plans and Advantages of the Paris Junior High School

The city of Paris is undertaking in a real way to enlarge its educational facilities. This expansion program affects the Junior High School very materially. The erection of a new modern gymnasium will make it possible for the Paris Junior High School to have next year a real course in Health Education. The program in Health Education will include games, drills, calisthenics, basket ball, and all kinds of group plays.

The High School building will make it possible for the Junior High School to have its own library and reading room, with books and magazines especially selected to suit the needs and desires of the Junior High School age.

The new High School building will include a new Manual Training and Mechanical Drawing room and two new Domestic Science rooms. This will permit the Junior High School to enlarge its program in industrial and practical arts.


The program of studies will be greatly enlarged, many new elective courses will be offered. The recitation period will include some time for supervised study and will be worked out according to the best school systems in America.

The most outstanding feature of the Paris Junior High School is the scholarship of the faculty. Every teacher in the Junior High School is a graduate of a standard American four-year college or university, and everyone has had some graduate work in his or her particular line of service. In the last analysis, the efficiency of any school system is the training of the teachers. The most far-reaching judgment a parent ever makes is the selection of his or her child's secondary school. The life ideals of your children depend largely upon the faculty of your child's secondary school. Two, three, or four years in *any* school is not the same as an equal period of time in the best school.

Paris Junior High School invites discriminating parents to visit the school and weigh well the advantages offered by this school for the safe and sane training of their children.

The spiritual well-being of your child is the outstanding objective of this school.


Parisian Circle
